## Exams

There will be four exams, the final included. These will consist of multiplechoice and true-false questions. Each exam counts 100 points, for a total of 400 points.

On the day of the final exam, I will also give a bonus exam for extra points if you choose to take it. It will contain about 20 to 25 questions worth one point each. These questions will be drawn from Chapter 6 of *Revolutions* and Chapters 10 and 11 of *World Societies*, which will not be covered in class. Obviously the bonus test is optional.

## Critical Paper

The book *Collapse* is to be used for a critical paper. Your paper is to be 3,000 words in length. Spend about half of your time summarizing the main ideas in the book, and then the other half providing your own reaction to it. Do you agree or disagree with the author? Why or why not? You can't just give personal opinions; you have to back them up with evidence and argument. It doesn't matter whether you agree or disagree with Diamond.

Your paper will be graded by one of our graduate student assistants. He will judge your paper on how well it develops the relevant ideas, not on the point of view you take. If you have additional questions, see the assistant.

I will give out a list of questions to help guide your thinking on *Collapse*. This will occur on the 10<sup>th</sup> class meeting during the discussion of this book.

# Grading

Your grade is based on 400 points for the 4 exams and 100 points for the critical paper, for a total of 500 points. At the end of the quarter I total up your points, determine your final percentage, and assign your grade based on the following scale:
